





# Southeast Louisiana CoCoRaHS Newsletter

## Heavy rains hit on the 29th

March started off on a cold note with late season light freezes during the first week. Mardi Gras Day, on March 4th, was one of the coldest Mardi Gras on record, particularly so late in the season. A rainy Ash Wednesday ensued when much of the area received one-half to one inch of rainfall that day. By the end of month, a late season cold front settled across the gulf coast and stalled. A series of upper level disturbances set off several rounds of heavy rainfall over southeast Louisiana into coastal Mississippi. The colorful image, lower left, shows that between 1.50" and 6.50 inches fell on the 29th. Some flooding ensued mainly in the Slidell area and along the Mississippi coast. This threw many of the area rivers to flood levels for a few days. The maximum rainfall was 6.58 inches reported on the morning of the 29th. This went a long way into the 11.30 inches of rain accumulated over the entire month at LA-ST-10, Slidell 0.2 SE.

## Comment of the Month -

From Slidell 0.2 SE (LA-ST-10)  
on March 29, 2014.

**"Severe yard flooding in late morning and afternoon after 4" of rain fell in about two hours followed by additional heavy rain. Entire yard was flooded at one point, reaching water depths as much as 10" in front yard. Streets also flooded up to 5 inches."**

This observer received the most rain in one day and for the monthly total. This was an excellent entry of additional information from this heavy rain event. The daily total at this location was 6.58 inches.
