


THANK YOU! CoCoRaHS March Madness Results

NEW: Add Photos to Your Hail Reports!


We LOVE it when you submit hail reports, and now they have gotten even better! All observers now have the option of submitting photos with hail reports. Photos that show the size of the hail, hail depth, damages, and storm impacts can add so much value to your hail report. Note: This option is only available on the website at this time. Hopefully it will be added to the app in the future.

These photos will not be available in realtime. A CoCoRaHS official will review the photo to ensure nothing inappropriate is in it. That may take up to 48-72 hours, but once approved, these photos will be available for everyone to see!

March 31—April 1 Severe Weather Outbreak

One of the largest severe weather outbreaks to affect the country since December 2021 occurred on March 31st and into the early morning hours of April 1st. Numerous tornadoes struck the Midwest and Southeast. In Middle Tennessee, five tornadoes were confirmed, causing extensive damage in Wayne, Lewis, Marshall, Rutherford, Cannon, Trousdale, Macon, and Lincoln counties. 












Meet Michael!
