



Your (Early) Christmas Forecast









December 9th Tornado Outbreak

In total, seven tornadoes impacted portions of Middle Tennessee on December 9th, making this one of the worst December tornado outbreaks to impact Middle Tennessee. Unfortunately, six people were killed, making this the deadliest outbreak for the area since the March 2020 event.
