CoCoRaHS Volunteer "Positions"

First position

Wanted --"Historic Data Quality Inspector" We are looking for one volunteer who loves climate data (precipitation data in particular), who likes staring at computer screens, and has time to look over older CoCoRaHS maps and reports to find errors in older data (anywhere from one month ago to several years back).

We've noticed that some bad data have crept into our system from well-intentioned observers who have either gotten off by a day in their data entry or who have missed by one or two decimal places, or have entered zeroes by mistake. If you would like to pour over older CoCoRaHS data (it is really easy with the new database "search" functions) and do something that will really help the credibility of our data and our program, then please let me know.

Second Position

Wanted "Northern Colorado CoCoRaHS phone checker" We get quite a few phone calls every day on our Larimer/Jackson county CoCoRaHS phone line. One volunteer has faithfully checked this phone and entered the data into the computer. She is still willing to help but would like a team member to share this responsibility. It probably takes an average of 20 minutes per day once you're experienced. If you are interested, please contact me. It is recommended that you reside within local calling distance of Fort Collins or else that you have unlimited free long distance service so that you can call, with no cost to you, to a Fort Collins phone number.

We highly recommend that anyone interested in helping in this way also take the severe weather spotter training classes offered by all National Weather Service offices across our multi-state area.

End of Message—expect to say that reports today showed that no one reported in excess of 1" of precipitation anywhere across the region for the first time in awhile. So far, out of 615 reports received today, the greatest precip. was 0.47" at Colorado City SW of Pueblo, CO Only 52 our of 615 stations reporting had measurable precip. with only 11 reports of more than 0.05" Remember, it is easy to compile this sort of statistics on the new site if you are so inclined. Just click View Data: Daily Precipitation Reports Click the state of your choice or "Select State" to get reports from all states at the same time. Then click on "Total Precip" in the column heading and it will sort all of the reports from largest to smallest for whatever data you select.

If you have better things to do with your summer (and there are plenty) then wait for a cold, windy, dark winter day and try this then.
